Poem

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

Put action in your action plan and build yourself a team


made of parents, made of teachers, made of family and friends,

Exercise 3:

Transition to Secondary School — Creative Writing

Exercise 4:

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Newspaper article





Write a newsletter about your new school.

Look for information on the school website, school social media pages and internet and report a story about life as a student/ the school environment/ current events at the school.

You might like to include:

- -How many students attend the school?
- -What is in the local area?
- -Did any famous/sports people attend?
- -What clubs are on offer?
- -What events have the school run this year?
- -Add a 'interview' with a current student or staff member

Tips on writing a newsletter (example layout above):

- Make your headline short and snappy.
- In the first sentence, sum up what the story is about.
- Write your report in the third person and the past tense.
- Split your newspaper report up into paragraphs to help the reader clearly understand the information.
- If you use quotes to make your report more interesting, don't forget to use speech marks.
- Use a photo with a caption to give the reader more information.
- Fill your newspaper report with both facts and opinions. Facts give the reader all of the information they need by using the 5 Ws (what, when, where, who, why)
